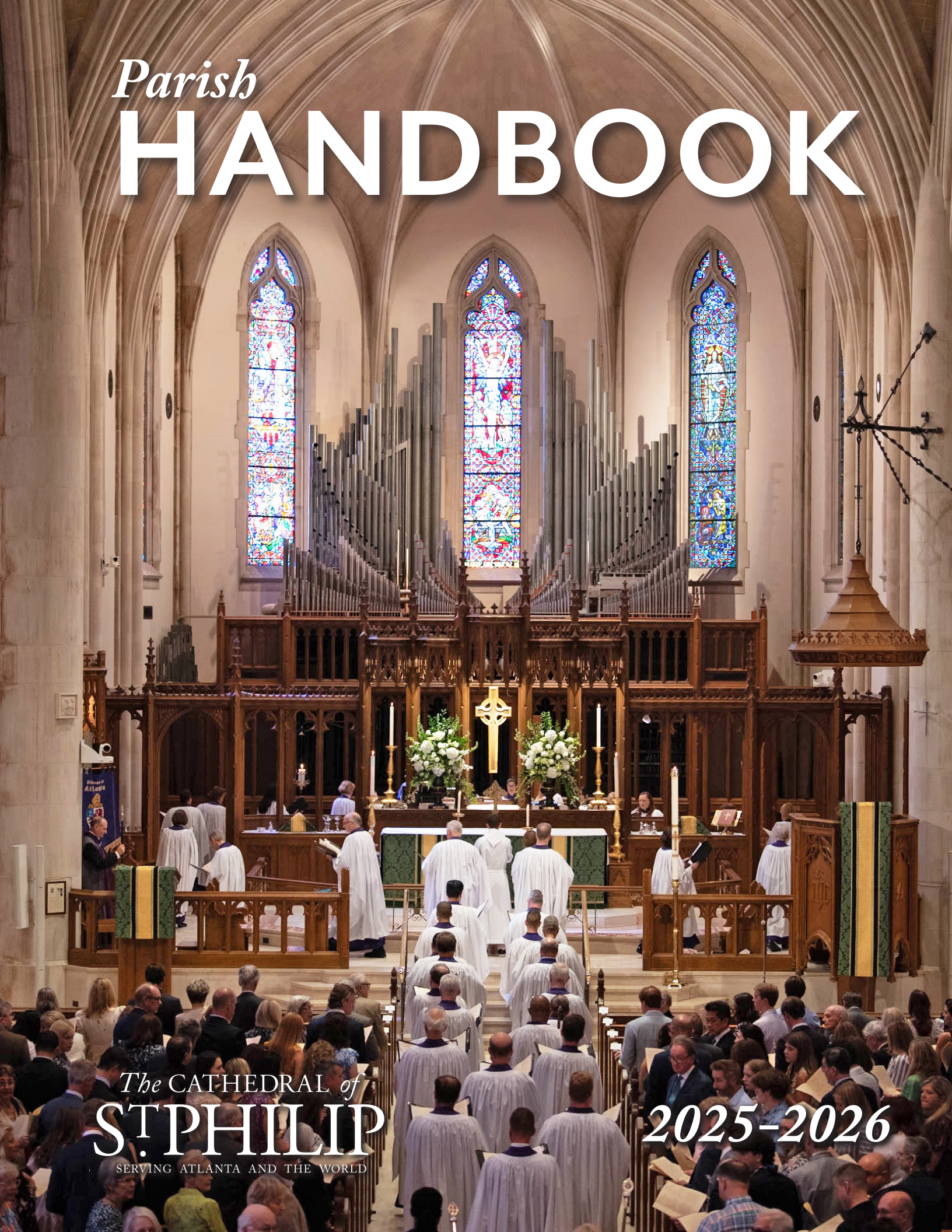

FROM THE DEAN

OUR ATLANTA HISTORY

Before we were designated the cathedral parish of Atlanta, St. Philip's Episcopal Church was established in 1846 with five communicants. Our first building was across from the new State Capitol on what is now the corner of Washington Street and Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive. By 1875 we were the largest Episcopal parish in Georgia, and in 1893, we became the Cathedral of the Diocese of Georgia. (All of the state was one diocese at that time.) We were in our third building.

By the 1930s the streets of Atlanta had been built up higher than the entrance to St. Philip's, and much of the parish had moved away. In 1933, under the leadership of the courageous Dean Raimundo De Ovies, St. Philip's Cathedral moved to its present location. The "little gray church" was built atop the hill at Andrews Drive and Peachtree, with its doors opening to the city.

The present Mikell Chapel was finished in 1947. De Ovies Memorial Hall, planned to house offices for both the Cathedral and the Diocese, was completed in 1951. The parish hall was completed in 1955. The grand Cathedral proper (replacing the little gray church) was dedicated and first used in 1962, and it was consecrated in 1980 when debt was retired.

Now more than 170 years old, the Cathedral Parish of St. Philip seeks to continue its history of service to the city and Diocese of Atlanta. We hope that our beacon on the hill can deliver the light of Jesus Christ to the world.

In 2024, exciting construction began on the Good Faith Chapel, a worship space for 200-300 people which seeks to inspire Cathedral prayer in a new way. It will be octagonal, featuring completely movable chairs and altar, dramatic video screen possibilities, and an oculus window at the top of the ceiling. We look forward to prayer and inspiration.

Though our architecture is grand, we are much more than our buildings. We are a thriving Christian community of faith, seeking to let the light of Jesus shine – in ourselves and in the world around us!



VISION AND MISSION

We have often remembered the mission statement in the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer: "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ" (page 855).

We strive to live out our Christian identity and mission by emphasizing three values—grace, excellence, and hospitality—all in the context of serving Jesus Christ. Grace is the elegant love of God; it is the love of God expressed in as simple and beautiful and economical a way as possible. Excellence is the desire to do things well, according to whatever the standard of the event or project is. Hospitality is respect; hospitality is welcoming everyone, including everyone, dignifying everyone, especially the stranger. Hospitality is serving others more than oneself.

Our patron saint, Philip, was a deacon, one who was called to serve. Thus, we serve one another with love and honor. We serve the city, the diocese, and the world. As grand as our location is, at the top of a beautiful hill in Atlanta, as strong as our "light on the hill" is, we remember the words of Jesus in Luke 22:27, "I am among you as one who serves." We seek to be in this world as a church who serves!

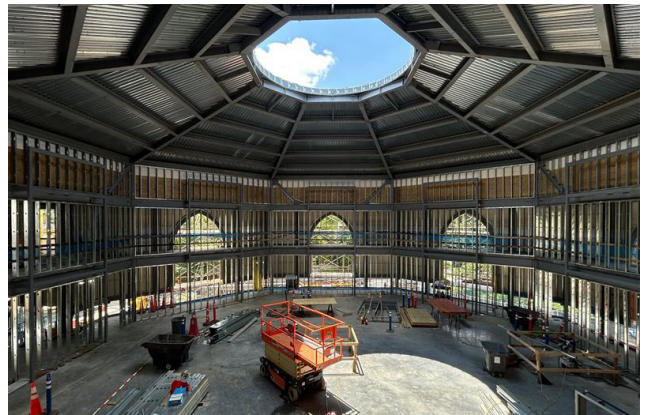
THE GOOD FAITH CHAPEL

The Good Faith Chapel, the Cathedral’s newest worship space, will be an expanded opportunity for prayer and contemplation, worship and education, invitation and mission, on our campus.

Based on the parish’s need and Dean Sam Candler’s vision for a quiet and flexible worship space, the octagonal chapel will supplement our existing Cathedral and chapels to allow for worship in many forms and a variety of configurations. The Good Faith Chapel will hold up to 300 people, and a movable altar and chairs designed by Luke Hughes will accommodate a variety of configurations, from worship in the round to children seated on the floor, and everything in between.

At the top of the Good Faith Chapel, an oculus—a 20-foot-wide window—will provide an unobstructed view of the sky and be “an eyepiece to the heavens,” as Dean Candler described it. Five large LED screens will adorn the walls with digital content, specially crafted for each service or season. The floor will be carpeted with a custom inlaid labyrinth design.

Designed by Cooper Carry architects and built by Holder Construction Company, the Good Faith Chapel is scheduled to open in spring 2026. Yellow Bird Project Management is managing the project on behalf of the Cathedral.





SUNDAY WORSHIP

Worshipping together is an essential part of our life here at the Cathedral. Each Sunday, we gather to celebrate the Holy Eucharist—also called Holy Communion or the Lord’s Supper—the central act of Christian worship. In this service, we come together as a community, hear and respond to God’s Word, share in the Communion, and are sent out to love and serve the Lord. All are welcome at any service.

7:45 A.M. HOLY EUCHARIST

A consistent community meets in Mikell Chapel, the oldest structure in the Cathedral, at 7:45 a.m. for a traditional liturgy without music. The service is quiet and meditative.

8:45 A.M. HOLY EUCHARIST

The 8:45 a.m. Eucharist presents the splendor of the Christian faith, with music, prayers, and sermons that draw upon the finest sources of our Anglican tradition. During this service, we also offer a special Children’s Chapel for children ages 4 through 5th grade.

11:15 A.M. HOLY EUCHARIST

The 11:15 a.m. Eucharist presents the splendor of the Christian faith in its most glorious Anglican fashion. Our music, prayers, and sermons draw upon the finest sources of our tradition. In addition to scripture lessons, this service includes a sung psalm.

11:15 A.M. LA SANTA EUCHARISTÍA

This Spanish-language service gathers in Mikell Chapel. Esta es una Santa Eucaristía, dando la bienvenida a la comunidad hispana a la Catedral y proveyendo a la población hispana de Atlanta un lugar seguro y amoroso de fe y tradición. ¡Todos son bienvenidos! All are welcome at this service!

4 P.M. EVENSONG AND HOLY EUCHARIST

September–May

One of the jewels of the Anglican tradition, Choral Evensong is the English Reformation’s fusion of the ancient evening prayer services of Vespers and Compline. Occasionally a classically sung Choral Eucharist, or a diocesan confirmation, or a service of Lessons and Carols takes the place of Evensong.

WEDDINGS

The Cathedral is a beautiful and holy place to celebrate your marriage! Marriages are normally celebrated on Saturdays, at a time agreed upon by the couple, officiant, and worship coordinator.

Counseling sessions with the officiating priest are required, as is a one-day premarital workshop, which is conducted through the Cathedral Counseling Center. To be married at the Cathedral, at least one of the persons in the couple must have been on the membership rolls for at least a year. The officiating clergy should first be contacted for consent.

We love baptisms and regard the sacrament of baptism as a Holy Mystery, which means we can understand the meaning of the act without ever fully fathoming the depths of its significance. The Cathedral of St. Philip joyfully welcomes new members into the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ through the sacrament of Holy Baptism.

WORSHIP SUPPORT OPPORTUNITIES

Worship at the Cathedral depends on the efforts of hundreds of parishioners whose support and dedication allow services to run smoothly. All of our liturgical volunteers are leaders who facilitate the congregation's prayer. We encourage you to consider being involved in any of the following areas.

ACOLYTES (YOUTH)

Youth acolytes, sixth grade and above, assist at the worship services at the Cathedral. Training is offered at the beginning of each school year and throughout the year as needed.

ACOLYTES (ADULTS)

Adult acolytes assist in the 4 p.m. worship services as well as other special services at the Cathedral. Training is offered as needed throughout the year.

ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild prepares the altar for the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on Sundays and during the week, and then reverently clears and stores the vessels and linens afterward. Members typically serve at one or two services per month. The ministry of altar guild is rooted in care, hospitality, and reverence; it is perfect for those who value sacred attention to detail and supporting the worship life of the church. Training is provided, and new members are always welcome.

BAPTISM GUILD

Baptism Guild members serve on the day of baptisms by greeting families, preparing baptismal records, and assisting the clergy. If you enjoy hospitality and meaningful moments, this is a beautiful way to serve.

BRASS POLISHING

These members polish all the brass used in worship services, including railings, candlesticks, and alms basins. Volunteers are divided into teams, serving two or three times a year.

CHOIRS

For information about the Cathedral Choirs, see page 12.

EUCCHARISTIC VISITORS

These confirmed members take the Holy Communion from the Sunday services to those who cannot attend church in person. Training is offered occasionally throughout the year.

FINANCE COUNT TEAMS

These teams are responsible for counting the offering on Sunday morning. Each team of four or five members serves every other month during the Sunday morning services. Team members often discover a great opportunity for fellowship in this "behind the scenes" ministry.





FLOWER GUILD

The Flower Guild designs and arranges flowers for Sunday services, weddings, receptions, and major feast days. Members serve as part of one of four teams, with each team taking a turn once per quarter. At Christmas and Easter, the whole guild comes together to prepare the Cathedral for these major celebrations.

Altar flowers in the Cathedral and Mikell Chapel may be given in memory or in thanksgiving for loved ones. The suggested donation is \$125 per name. To donate flowers, contact Liz Aull at 404-365-1034.

FUNERAL GUILD

The Funeral Guild supports families and guests on the day of a funeral by providing hospitality, assisting with altar guild duties, and serving as ushers and greeters. It is a ministry of presence, compassion, and offering quiet support during one of life's most tender moments.

INTERCESSORS AND LECTORS

Confirmed members serve as lectors by reading the scriptural lessons or as intercessors by leading the Prayers of the People during Sunday morning Eucharist and other major services. It's a visible and meaningful way to participate in worship. Training is offered periodically throughout the year, and new voices are always welcome.

USHERS

Ushering at the Cathedral is first and foremost a ministry of hospitality. Ushers greet and welcome parishioners, distribute leaflets, assist with seating and special needs, collect and present the offering, and usher communicants. Sunday usher teams typically serve two consecutive Sundays every two months, while other ushers serve as needed for funerals and other special services. This is a very rewarding experience and offers opportunities to meet and make new friends

WEDDING GUILD

Wedding Guild members assist the clergy and families during both the rehearsal and the wedding ceremony, helping things run smoothly behind the scenes. They serve several times a year and meet regularly to stay connected and prepared. This guild is a great fit for those who enjoy hospitality, coordination, and being part of joyful milestones.

MUSIC

Some 45 adult volunteer singers, 14 staff singers, 25 choristers (children and youth), along with our Organ/Church Music Intern, Organist and Associate Choirmaster, and Canon for Music provide music for approximately 225 Cathedral services and 75 weddings and funerals each year. Opportunities to become involved in the Cathedral’s music ministry are as follows:

CATHEDRAL CHOIR

The Cathedral Choir is an auditioned group of approximately 40 volunteers and 14 professional singers which sings for the 11:15 a.m. service each Sunday, for the 8:45 a.m. service once a month, and for various special liturgies throughout the liturgical year. The Cathedral Choir typically presents a major sacred choral work with orchestra each season. To audition, contact the music office at music@cathedralATL.org or 404-365-1050.

CATHEDRAL SCHOLA

The Cathedral Schola is a highly skilled chamber choir of auditioned singers selected from the Cathedral Choir. The Schola sings Evensong, Choral Eucharists, or services of Lessons and Carols at 4 p.m. on most Sundays September through May, and collaborates regularly with the Atlanta Baroque Orchestra, who are entering their ninth season as artists-in-residence. Together with the Cathedral Choir, they have recorded three compact discs for Gothic Records for international release. CATHEDRAL CHORISTERS

The Cathedral Chorister program is a broadly conceived educational opportunity based on the Royal School of Church Music curriculum, integrating musical training and Christian formation while nurturing the development of the whole person. The Chorister program is open to boys and girls in third grade through high school. Choristers sing for the 8:45 a.m. service several times per month, typically with members of the Cathedral Singers (staff singers). They also sing for special services on All Saints’ Sunday, Christmas Eve, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Easter Day, and join with the Cathedral Schola to sing Choral Evensong once or twice a season. ALLEGRO: MUSIC FOR YOUNG CHILDREN

The music and children’s ministries departments jointly sponsor Allegro: Music for Young Children and the Allegro Choir for kindergarten, first, and second grades for our pre-chorister-age youngsters. Using play, movement, singing, and musical instruments, children develop musical skills and an appreciation for music. The program is divided into groups by age, from birth through second grade. SPIRITUALITY

OUR APPROACH TO SPIRITUALITY

At the Cathedral of St. Philip, spirituality is not a private pursuit or a specialized calling—it is the ordinary and ongoing work of living out our baptismal identity. Rooted in the Anglican tradition, we understand spirituality as the way we cooperate with the Holy Spirit to become more fully who we are in Christ, both as individuals and as a parish community.

We recognize that each person's spiritual journey is unique, yet we are formed together through common prayer, shared practice, and intentional reflection. Spirituality at the Cathedral is grounded in:

- The Baptismal Covenant as the foundation for adult Christian life;
- Spiritual practices—such as daily prayer, Eucharist, reflection, and service—that help us remain open and responsive to God's presence;
- A communal rhythm of life, where mutual support and honest conversation deepen our awareness and commitment;
- A developmental approach, recognizing that people grow at different paces and in different ways, and that the Church's role is to meet people where they are and walk with them.

We offer a variety of opportunities for individuals and groups to explore and deepen their spiritual life. These are not ends in themselves, but resources that help us live with greater compassion, wisdom, and freedom in the world.

Whether you're seeking clarity, renewal, or simply a next step, we invite you to engage with these offerings as part of your unfolding life in Christ.

CONFERENCE POETRY, PRAYER, AND PLACE WITH PÁDRAIG Ó TUAMA *Saturday, October 18, 2025*



We carry desire and location with us: desires for change, improvement, revenge, release, joy or achievement; and locations of home or exile or anything in between. This retreat day will consider poems of longing and land, and by doing so, deepen reflection on language, truth, creativity and communication. There will be some writing exercises during the day — it is open to first time writers, as well as those who've been writing for a long time.

Poet and theologian Pádraig Ó Tuama's work centers around themes of language, power, conflict, and religion. Working fluently on the page and in public, he is a compelling poet and skilled speaker, teacher, and group worker. He has worked with groups to explore story, conflict, their relationship with religion and argument, and violence. Using poetry, group discussion, and lectures, his work is marked both by lyricism and pragmatism, and includes a practice of evoking stories and participation from attendees at his always-popular lectures, retreats, and events.

He presents *Poetry Unbound* with On Being Studios. From 2014-2019 he was the leader of the Corrymeela Community, Ireland's oldest peace and reconciliation community. With undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in theology, multiple professional qualifications in conflict mediation (specializing in groups), he also holds a PhD (Poetry and Theology) from the University of Glasgow. Our Quiet Days during Advent (December 6, 2025) and Lent (February 28, 2026) invite us to take a break from the business and “busy-ness” of our everyday lives and listen in an intentional way to God’s invitation in our spiritual journey.

WOMEN’S RETREAT

Also in Lent, women of the Cathedral will be retreating to St. Mary’s Sewanee, from March 13–15, 2026, for a weekend of fellowship, prayer, spiritual renewal, and rest.



CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER AND PRACTICE

The Cathedral has traditionally offered a variety of contemplative practices, such as centering prayer, quiet days, and seasonal retreats. These practices are ways of opening ourselves to the presence and action of God beyond words, thoughts, and emotions. Rooted in the ancient Christian tradition, they invite us into stillness, silence, and receptivity. Rather than asking or thinking, we simply rest in God’s presence, allowing the Spirit to pray within us.

TAIZÉ

Taizé is an ecumenical monastic community in southern France that developed a beautiful style of prayer and attracts more than 2,000 visitors a week. During this service, simple chants are sung repetitiously; these chants become prayers of the heart. Scripture is heard, and there is an extended period of silent prayer. The service is offered the third Monday of every month from 8 to 9 p.m. in Mikell Chapel.

LABYRINTH

The labyrinth is an ancient path of prayer dating back to the medieval period of history. The third Monday of every month, we offer a facilitated labyrinth walk at 7 p.m., with an orientation at 6:45 p.m. for those new to the labyrinth. We also offer special, seasonal walks throughout the year. Brochures about the labyrinth are available in the Atrium. The outdoor labyrinth in front of the Lanier House is open daily.

CENTERING PRAYER

Centering Prayer, in particular, is a method of silent prayer that prepares us to receive the gift of contemplative awareness. By gently letting go of distractions and returning to a sacred word, we cultivate a deeper trust in God and a more spacious, peaceful inner peace. OLD FASHIONED SUNDAY SCHOOL

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

At the Cathedral of St. Philip, adult education is more than learning about faith—it's about learning how to live it. Our adult formation offerings are designed to support adults in living out their baptismal promises through intentional spiritual practice, deeper reflection, and active participation in the life of the Church.

We recognize that formation is lifelong. Whether you are new to the Episcopal Church or have been a member for decades, our programs invite you into a process of growing in awareness, maturity, and faithfulness. We understand spiritual growth as both individual and communal: shaped by the Holy Spirit, nurtured by common prayer, and sustained by practices that help us stay awake to God's presence in our daily lives.

Our adult education offerings include seasonal courses, small groups, retreats, and parish-wide learning opportunities. These programs aim to:

- Help participants grow in clarity about their own spiritual journey.
- Foster habits of prayer, reflection, and service rooted in the Anglican tradition.
- Connect people more deeply to the Cathedral parish as a spiritual community.
- Encourage lives marked by compassion, integrity, and courage.

Formation is not just about gaining knowledge. It's about becoming the kind of person—individually and together—that can live the Christian life in today's world. We invite you to join us in this journey.

LIVING FAITH

In the fall of 2025, the class will discuss Richard Rohr's new book, *The Tears of Things: Prophetic Wisdom for an Age of Outrage*. Drawing upon the writings of the Hebrew prophets, Rohr seeks to address questions such as "How do we live compassionately in a time of violence and despair? What can we do with our private disappointments and the anger we feel in such an unjust world?"

ADULT CONFIRMATION CLASS

ENJOY BIBLICAL GREEK!

This newcomer-friendly class is open to beginners, while including long-term members who enjoy exchanging tips, best learning practices, and coaching points on how to translate the Greek New Testament. The goal is enhanced Bible study, not language mastery.

Cost-free, online resources are provided, in addition to traditional grammar aids, lexicons and commentaries, that yield immense satisfaction in discovering how the Greek text reveals nuance and depth in scripture.

Provided on a drop-in basis, first-time visitors need no previous knowledge of Greek. Classes typically begin with reciting the alphabet, pronunciation practice, and accessible grammar instruction prior to a half-hour or so of collaborative, rewarding translation.

OLD FASHIONED SUNDAY SCHOOL

How to be an Episcopalian?

An Exploration of the Foundations for a Christian Life in the Episcopal Tradition

This yearlong course is designed to ground participants in the thinking and practices of the Christian faith as lived in the Episcopal Church. Across four seasonal terms, we will explore the rhythm, depth, and invitation of the Christian spiritual life.

The aim is not merely education, but transformation: to set loose an energy in individuals that stirs new thinking and behavior—opening the way to a new place in one’s spiritual journey. Each term will combine theological reflection, personal practice, and communal conversation.

Advent Term: The Threefold Rule of Prayer

In the season of preparation, we explore how the classic Threefold Rule of Prayer—Eucharist, Daily Office, and Personal Devotion—offers a full and balanced spirituality. Participants will be invited to experiment with and reflect on new or renewed practices of prayer that support deeper attentiveness to God’s presence.

Epiphany Term: Benedictine Spirituality

Building on themes of light and revelation, this term draws on the Benedictine Promise—Obedience, Stability, and Conversion of Life—to help participants assess their own spiritual posture and that of their parish. We will deepen our capacity to notice the dynamics of the Promise in our lives, and explore connections between Benedictine wisdom, the Book of Common Prayer, and Anglican spirituality.

Lenten Term: Living the Season of Lent

Lent is not just a time of giving things up—it is an invitation to enter into the pattern of Christ’s dying and rising. In this short but focused term, we will consider how to approach Lent as a season of spiritual clarity and intentional practice. Participants will be guided in selecting Lenten disciplines that are rooted in prayer, self-examination, and renewal, and supported in making the most of this sacred time.

Easter Term: The Christian Life

As we move into the joy of resurrection, we turn to the broader pattern of Christian living. Participants will assess their own spiritual landscape and explore the dynamics among its key elements. The term culminates in the development of a personal “Rule of Life,” a practical framework to support ongoing growth in faith—offered as a gift to be used now or returned to later.

This re-imagined class, 'After *The Chosen*: Media and Spirituality,' underscores Chris Deville's (*The Atlantic*) cue of 'using *The Chosen* to start effective spiritual conversations"—whether with "skeptical friends or the converted.' That's precisely what Cathedral members have done since beginning in 2023 to view and discuss this century's most highly acclaimed Christian television series. Now here's a new challenge: all media viewing as a spiritual practice in its own right.

Writing for the CREDO Institute (our Episcopal Church health and wellness agency), Renée Miller offers a book chapter on films and movies as opportunities for a spirituality of "Media Practice." Miller's claims prompt a query: How may we practice spiritual discernment of all media—even social media from Facebook to TikTok? Using her *Strength for the Journey: A Guide to Spiritual Practice*, our class anticipates far more vistas ahead after deploying *The Chosen* as a framework for viewing other media productions, or as a best practice for strengthening our own faith journeys, or as a resource for spiritual sojourning with skeptical friends. EFM: EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

YOUTH

Cathedral youth ministry encompasses Sunday school, Bible study, service opportunities, and fellowship gatherings. However, there are many ways that our young people engage with and contribute to the Cathedral community. Youth participate as acolytes, choristers, outreach volunteers, mentors, and more!

Building upon the foundation established in our children's Sunday school curriculum, Godly Play, our youth program supports middle and high school students as they grow into the full stature of their Christian identity. With attention to worship, community, education, leadership, and service, youth have opportunities to explore all aspects of our faith community.

Each year, all eighth graders are invited to prepare for confirmation by intentionally exploring their faith — specifically, within the Episcopal tradition, with a particular emphasis on the Liturgy of Confirmation, the Episcopal Catechism, and Baptismal Covenant.

High school students can take on leadership roles by leading Bible study, planning youth outings, serving as acolyte team captains, mentoring confirmation small groups, and participating as senior choristers. Additionally, the youth program hosts social activities and outings that serve to build community and establish

a safe, accepting, affirming, and fun environment for all youth. We also encourage participation in the many diocesan youth retreats and programs that are made available through the Diocese of Atlanta.

During the program year, join us on the third floor youth hall for Sunday school, Sunday evening EYC, or Tuesday evenings for Bible study and pizza — and watch for other outings, retreats, and programs throughout the year. CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

We believe that children of all ages growing up in the church are formed as much outside the classroom as within it. Helping parents to access age-appropriate ways to participate in and reflect on our liturgical life, our sacred stories, our call to Christian service, our charge to share the Good News, and our shared spiritual life is essential to our ministry with children.

The Anglican liturgy is the cornerstone of our identity as Episcopalians and participation in the liturgy is an essential part of children's Christian formation. Children are always welcome in church; children's chapels follow the structure of the Liturgy of the Word before children join their parents for Eucharist; and our Sunday School classes are organized to reflect the pattern of gathering, story, response, prayer, feast, and dismissal found in our communal worship.

Godly Play is at the heart of our Sunday morning classes, and the Godly Play philosophy permeates all that we do with children and families at the Cathedral. In short, that means that we take children and their relationship with God seriously and seek to provide both the space to foster encounters with God and the language necessary to make meaning of those experiences. Within the Godly Play classroom, the Biblical narrative is lovingly presented to children using beautiful materials with an invitation to step into each story with awe and wonder. Children are then allowed time to respond to and reflect on their experience of the story.

Seasonal celebrations are occasions for both Christian fellowship and service for children and their families. We take care to mark both the secular and liturgical year with events such as the beginning of the school year backpack blessing, Halloween costume blessing, Advent wreath making, St. Nicholas celebration, Christmas present collection and wrapping, Lenten family services, and Week of Wonder, our Vacation Bible School. EYSeedlings, a junior youth group for fourth and fifth grade students, meets monthly to engage in more Christian fellowship. HISPANIC MINISTRIES

The Hispanic Ministry has remained consistent over the past year. The Sunday Koinonia services are held at 11:15 a.m. with Deacon Juan Sandoval. There has been an increased number of families who attend consistently on Sundays. We have three acolytes who assist on Sundays, Leslie and Osiris Gatica, and Edith Baños. Karen Bunn continues to be our organist.

During the past year we have had fifteen baptisms, one presentation of a 40-day-old, two presentations of a three-year-old, and three quinceañeras. We continue to have monthly birthday celebrations that are well attended. Pastoral care continues to members of the Hispanic community. There were five children in the informed first communion class offered in Spanish. We will celebrate the Feast of the Virgin of Guadalupe on December 11 with the youth playing various parts in the story of Juan Diego. During Holy Week, we provided an outdoor walking version of Via Crucis (Stations of the Cross) starting in the labyrinth and around the church ending in the Memorial Garden.

We will continue to serve the community with baptisms, quinceañeras, weddings, presentations, confirmation classes (for those who attend the Spanish language service, prospective confirmands have begun attending the confirmation classes in English), and adult education. All are welcome to attend these Spanish-language services.

El Ministerio Hispano se ha mantenido constante durante el último año. Los servicios dominicales de Koinonía se llevan a cabo a las 11:15 a. m. con el diácono Juan Sandoval. Continuaremos sirviendo a la comunidad con bautizos, quinceañeras, bodas, presentaciones, clases de confirmación (para quienes asisten al servicio en español, los futuros confirmandos ya han comenzado a asistir a las clases de confirmación en inglés) y educación para adultos. Todos están invitados a asistir a estos servicios en español.

MEMBERSHIP

There are several different categories of membership. The word “member” denotes either a confirmed communicant or baptized member:

CONFIRMED MEMBERS

Confirmed communicants are baptized persons who have been confirmed in, or received into, the Episcopal Church and whose names are enrolled in the parish register. Names are enrolled either by confirmation, reception, or letter of transfer from another Episcopal Church. One must be listed in the parish register to be eligible to vote in parish elections and to hold various offices in the church.

BAPTIZED MEMBERS

All baptized persons of any age may be enrolled in the parish register. Names are enrolled either by baptism, letter of transfer, or by personal request.

ASSOCIATES

Associates are persons who are active in the life of this congregation (through worship, giving, or program participation), but whose official membership remains elsewhere.

STEWARDSHIP

All parishioners are given the opportunity of making an annual pledge. When you are asked to make a monetary pledge and to participate in the work of this Cathedral, please do so knowing that you are giving back a part of God’s gifts to you. Gifts to the operating budget support the day-to-day expenses of the parish such as salaries for clergy and lay staff, utility expenses, and outreach. OUTREACH

When we gather for Holy Eucharist, we are sent out at the end of the service with the dismissal: “Go in peace, to love and serve the Lord!” We are a sent people, who seek to love and serve God wherever we go and whatever we are doing. We are also pilgrims, who go with the expectation of encountering God through others and of being renewed and transformed by that encounter.

As a Cathedral, we reach out through specific Cathedral outreach programs, our hospitality as a “house of prayer for all people,” our parochial entities, volunteer and financial support of partner ministries, and, most importantly, the many ways that Cathedral parishioners respond to Jesus’ commission throughout their lives.

Our Cathedral outreach programs seek to be a sign of Christ’s love, mercy, and justice in this world, while nurturing spiritual growth and community among those who participate in them. Below are some of the many opportunities for you to go with us! For more information about outreach at the Cathedral contact the Rev. Canon Julia Mitchener at julia.mitchener@cathedralATL.org.

HOUSING INSECURITY AND HOMELESSNESS

BCMGeorgia works to keep people from becoming homeless and to promote economic stability. Volunteers are needed to help mentor individuals and families enrolled in BCM’s financial education programs. The COPE (Cost of Poverty Experience) is hosted annually at the Cathedral to increase understanding of the challenges faced by our most vulnerable neighbors.

Church of the Common Ground (CCG) is a “church without walls” that worships downtown in Woodruff Park every Sunday at 1 p.m. The Cathedral has two teams that prepare and deliver sack lunches to CCG, then stay for services and fellowship. We also host the annual CCG Christmas party each December.

Crossroads Community Ministries provides access to resources that help people experiencing homelessness progress on the road to economic and personal stability. Volunteers help serve meals in Clyde’s Kitchen, assist in the mailroom, and greet guests coming in for assistance.

Habitat for Humanity

The Cathedral has helped to complete 35 Habitat houses. Each December, volunteers assemble and deliver Christmas baskets to homeowners.

The 37th Annual Homeless Requiem

This beloved event memorializes Atlantans who have died in the past year while unhoused. A foot clinic, COVID and flu vaccines, childcare, a clothing closet, employment assistance, and a delicious meal are among the services offered to guests prior to the liturgy. Several hundred parishioners of all ages volunteer before, during, or after the Requiem.

Intown Cares offers support services to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and food insecurity. Individuals, groups or families can sign up to help stock shelves at the food bank, inventory donations, and assist clients at twice weekly food distributions. The Cathedral also collects non-perishable food items for Intown Cares each month, and the Cathedral Farmers Market contributes fresh produce every week when in season.

Parish Grove (formerly Cathedral Towers) is a mid-rise apartment building located next to the Cathedral campus offering affordable housing for seniors. The Cathedral provides a weekly Bible study and monthly Eucharist for residents, monthly birthday parties, and lay chaplaincy services. There are also special events such as house blessings, animal blessings, hymn sings, game nights, and the annual Christmas Caroling Party featuring the children of the Allegro Choir. Individuals and families may sign up to be paired with a Parish Grove “buddy,” providing companionship and support to residents who request it.

PCCI (Project Community Connections, Inc.) seeks to disrupt cycles of homelessness and to secure quality, affordable homes for our community to live and thrive. The Cathedral hosts PCCI’s annual 5K for Housing, Hope, and Resilience in February. Parishioners of all ages run or walk, sponsor and cheer on participants, and provide assistance on the race course and in the race village.

CHILDREN, YOUTH AND EDUCATION

Through our partnership with **LaAmistad**, the Cathedral hosts two dozen Latino students from Garden Hills Elementary School four afternoons per week. Cathedral staff and volunteers provide a warm welcome, snacks, a weekly chapel service, supervised play time, and seasonal celebrations. LaAmistad tutors help students with schoolwork. Parishioners with a particular interest such as knitting, arts and crafts, sports, cooking, or music can volunteer to teach their hobby to the children.

The Boyce L. Ansley School is a tuition free private elementary school located in downtown Atlanta for children impacted by homelessness. There are volunteer opportunities for individuals and groups, including teacher appreciation events, sorting and organizing student uniforms, office assistance, campus clean up, helping with special programs, and much more.

The Cathedral Scholars program provides financial, vocational, social, and spiritual support to individuals pursuing their educational goals. Scholarships help fill the gap between the aid students have received from their academic institutions, various grants and work-study programs, loans, family contributions, and that

which is still required for them to be able to attend school. In many cases, the funds awarded by a Cathedral scholarship makes the difference in whether a student can attend their college of choice, or, indeed, attend college at all. In addition to financial aid, students enjoy networking opportunities and fellowship with one another at Cathedral sponsored social events during school breaks.

Emmaus House is a ministry of the Diocese of Atlanta offering an array of community services to residents of the Peopletown neighborhood. Cathedral parishioners serve as volunteers at the food pantry, assist with the after school program and help support the summer Freedom School. St. Monica's Guild sponsors an annual toy drive for the Emmaus House Christmas party.

The Summer Outreach Speaker Series takes place in Child Hall during the Sunday School hour each July and August. Leaders of Cathedral outreach initiatives and diocesan ministries as well as representatives of our community outreach partners share about their work and encourage parishioner participation.



ADDITIONAL OUTREACH OPPORTUNITIES

Cathedral Advocates

This emerging ministry encourages parishioners to live out their baptismal covenant to strive for justice and peace among all people. Volunteer opportunities include educational events, book studies, letter writing, prayer vigils, and more.

Church of the Holy Comforter is a mission of the Diocese of Atlanta that seeks to restore all people to unity with God and with each other. About 60% of its parishioners live with mental illness. The Cathedral helps serve lunch at the church's Friendship Center every other month. Help is also welcome in the community garden.

CO-OP (Community of Outreach Partners)

This group provides volunteer support for a wide array of Cathedral outreach opportunities. Parishioners can sign up to be added to an email distribution list and receive regular updates about when and where help is needed.

Respite Care Atlanta provides spiritually integrated respite care for adults with early to mid-stage cognitive challenges. Volunteers get to share their special talents and ideas while helping to provide a safe and stimulating environment for program participants.

Prison Ministries allow trained and licensed volunteers to share faith and hope with women at Arrendale Prison. The Cathedral also supports community organizations such as Parole Advocates, Inc. and Motherhood Beyond Bars, and volunteer opportunities are available with each.

Race and Healing Ministries offer opportunities to engage in the quest for racial justice. Equitable Dinners provide the chance to gather with individuals from both the parish and the wider community for a meal, one act play, and conversation about racism. Classes and book studies allow parishioners of all ages to explore our relationships with race and to learn what our faith teaches us. Pilgrimages to civil rights memorials and museums around the South are offered periodically, and a pilgrimage to Cape Coast, Ghana is planned for 2027.

The Cathedral Towers Fund and

The Plummer Outreach Fund

These two endowed funds totaling close to \$50 million (both due to begin offering grants in 2026) provide substantial resources for ministry with our most vulnerable neighbors. Grant committees study needs, dialogue with community partners, and receive requests for assistance with major projects seeking to provide housing and supportive services for seniors (Cathedral Towers Fund) and help with housing, food, education, healthcare, and other necessities for individuals and families of all ages (Plummer Outreach Fund).

PASTORAL CARE

“I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.”

– John 13:34-35

In this Cathedral parish, the love of God is not just proclaimed in our preaching; it’s practiced, person to person, through the work of pastoral care. Pastoral ministry encompasses all the many ways we care for, pray with, and share Christ’s love with one another. One distilled definition of pastoral care is “paying attention to the needs of others with the love of Christ.” Here at the Cathedral, we pay attention. We engage in one another’s lives with compassion, listening deeply and remembering faithfully. The most important and most effective pastoral caregivers here are you—the members of this Cathedral parish!

We are all pastoral caregivers. Every time you reach out to a friend, welcome a newcomer or stranger, invite someone to participate in one of your small groups, listen, or simply pay attention to whoever is around you, you are offering important pastoral care. Small groups—guilds, ministry groups, and Bible studies, for example—are great sources of pastoral care. Thank you for being signs of God’s love to one another! Below you’ll find program offerings rooted in pastoral care.

CONGREGATIONAL CARE

In light of our call to care for one another, the Cathedral maintains an active prayer list, so that we can pray together for those in need among us. Many groups in our church, including our Sunday congregations, pray over these prayer lists. To add a name to the prayer list, contact Hillary Jones.

In addition to the important pastoral care that happens within the community, we have dedicated clergy and pastoral care staff, who really do care about you and want to hear from you!

The pastoral care ministry does not have the experience, personnel, or resources to provide long-term care, case management, or financial assistance. However, we do have the ability to connect you with agencies whose mission is to provide such care.

You can support our ministry by letting us know if you or someone you know would benefit from pastoral care.

APPLIED SUICIDE INTERVENTION SKILLS TRAINING (ASIST)

Whether at work, at home, with friends or teammates, or in more formal helping roles, many of us have been, or will be, called upon to respond to someone who is experiencing a mental-health crisis or considering suicide. The Cathedral hosts a two-day workshop in one of the world’s leading suicide-intervention models, Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST). ASIST teaches individuals to provide a skilled intervention to a person who may be having thoughts of suicide and develop a collaborative safety plan to keep them safe and alive.

COMMUNITY OF HOPE

Community of Hope is a program in lay pastoral care, which supports lay leaders and caregivers through intentional community, education and reflection, and spiritual formation. For information on how to join Community of Hope, please contact the Rev. Canon David Boyd, david.boyd@cathedralATL.org.

EUCCHARISTIC VISITORS

Lay Eucharistic Visitors participate in the Sunday Eucharist as they are sent out to take the sacraments to those who are sick or unable to attend church. In addition to volunteers, we are looking for names of parishioners to visit.

FUNERAL AND WEDDING GUILDS

These guilds provide important assistance, hospitality, and worship support for pastoral liturgies. The Funeral Guild also sponsors “Changed, Not Ended,” a workshop equipping parishioners with resources both theological and practical to plan and prepare for their own funeral.

GRIEF SUPPORT GROUP

In partnership with Hospice Atlanta, the Cathedral hosts a grief-support group, open to anyone grieving the death of a loved one.

PARISH GROVE CHAPLAIN PROGRAM

Cathedral parishioners serve as volunteer chaplains at Parish Grove (formerly Cathedral Towers), offering pastoral support to residents of this affordable senior housing community. Candidates must go through a screening and training process with National Church Residences before being licensed. For more information, please contact the Rev. 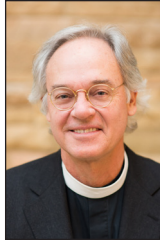

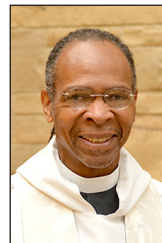

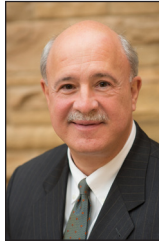
